# Oswegoland Park District Community Survey

# August 2023



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# **Executive Summary**

The Oswegoland Park District commissioned the Center for Governmental Studies (CGS) at Northern Illinois University to conduct a multi-mode survey (online, mail, and telephone reminder calls) of residents. The purpose of the survey was to gather residents' opinions about the Oswegoland Park District's facilities, programs, and services, and to determine residents' recreation needs. A total of 528 completed surveys was received.

#### **Findings**

# **Overall Opinion of the Park District**

- The respondents were asked to rate their overall opinion of the Oswegoland Park District on a scale of "0" (completely dislike) to "10" (highest regard). 79.4% of the respondents have a positive impression of the Park District (rating of "6" or higher). The mean rating given was 7.53.
- When respondents were asked their *favorite* thing about the Park District the top responses were the parks (16.5%), the variety, number, or type of programs and events (16.5%), the walking and bike trails/paths (11.0%), and the programs/activities for children (10.2%).
- When respondents were asked their *least favorite* thing about the Park District a wide variety of responses were given. The most common responses were cost (9.0%) and upkeep/maintenance of parks and facilities (7.0%).
- Four-fifths (80.0%) of respondents indicated their household is likely to use the Oswegoland Park District during the next 12 months, with 63.2% indicating their household is very likely.

#### Awareness and Use of the Park District

- Awareness is highest for the PrairieFest (83.2%), Civic Center Aquatic Park (79.2%), Civic Center (77.3%), and Fox Bend Golf Course (73.3%) and lowest for Community Park at Grande Park (27.6%) and South Point Center (43.3%).
- Those respondents who were aware of a park, facility, or community festival were then asked whether their household had visited or attended the park, facility, or community festival during the past 12 months. Seven out of ten respondents stated they visited Hudson Crossing Park (72.9%) and Prairie Point Community Park (72.5%). About one-half or less of respondents reported that their household had visited or attended the other parks, facilities, and community festivals asked about in the survey.
- The majority of respondents have used the Oswegoland Park District during the past 12 months for all of the recreational activities asked about in the survey except for theatre (47.7%), adult sports leagues (42.2%), adult classes (37.4%), and fitness (33.9%). Almost one-third (31.3%) of respondents indicated their needs are not being met by any organization for adult sports leagues, one fourth (25.3%) of respondents stated their needs are not being

met by any organization for adult classes, and 10.4% of respondents reported their needs are not being met by any organization for fitness.

#### Satisfaction With the Park District

- The majority of respondents were satisfied with each of the parks, facilities, and community festivals asked about in the survey. The highest percentage of respondents stated they are satisfied with Prairie Community Park (95.6%) and the lowest percentages of respondents indicated they were satisfied with Boulder Point (80.4%) and the Civic Center (80.5%).
- Most respondents were satisfied with the appearance (93.7%), cleanliness (93.6%), and maintenance of the parks and facilities (88.9%).
- The majority of respondents were satisfied with the Park District programs asked about in the survey. Satisfaction was highest for the As We Grow Preschool (98.6%) and dance (97.3%). Satisfaction was lowest for fitness (79.0%), adult classes (81.8%) and the adult sport leagues (83.3%).
- More than four-fifths of respondents were satisfied with the customer service provided by Park District staff (90.9%), the Park District social media (82.8%), the ease of registering for programs (82.1%), the Park District website (81.7%), the availability of information about parks/facilities (81.3%), and the availability of information about programs (81.2%).

#### Value of the Park District

- The majority (88.4%) of respondents believe the Park District is valuable to their community. Compared with 78.8% of respondents who think the Park District is valuable to their household.
- Three-fourths (75.0%) of respondents believe the overall value of the Park District, given its share of the property taxes is excellent or good.
- Only 18.9% of respondents were aware that the Park District offers financial assistance to eligible households.

#### **Future Direction of the Park District**

• Most respondents were supportive of the Park District budgeting funds for maintaining and improving the current aquatic facilities (92.2%) and acquiring land for parks (87.8%).

#### Information Sources About the Park District

• More than two-fifths (43.7%) of respondents reported they learn about the Park District from the community banners/signs, with 23.2% indicating it is their preferred source. 43.3% of respondents said they learn about the Park District from the Park District website, with 23.4% indicating it is their preferred source. 38.9% of respondents state they learn about the Park District from Park District emails, with 35.6% saying it is their preferred source.

37.5% of respondents indicated they learn about the Park District from the digital seasonal brochure, with 27.5% reporting it is their preferred source. More than one-fourth (28.7%) of respondents reported they learn about the Park District from social media, with 21.5% stating it is their preferred source.

# Introduction

#### **Background and Purpose**

The Oswegoland Park District commissioned the Center for Governmental Studies (CGS) at Northern Illinois University to conduct a survey of residents to gather their opinions about the Oswegoland Park District's facilities, programs, and services, and to determine residents' recreation needs. A multi-mode survey (online, mail, and telephone reminder calls) was administrated to a random sample of households in the Park District's service area. The findings of the survey will be used for strategic planning.

# **Methodology**

#### Questionnaire

A 32-question survey was developed by CGS and the Oswegoland Park District staff. The following topics were covered in the questionnaire:

- overall opinion of the Park District,
- awareness and use of the Park District,
- satisfaction with the Park District,
- value of the Park District.
- future direction of the Park District, and
- information sources about the Park District.

The questionnaire was translated into Spanish. The questionnaire may be found in Appendix A.

#### Sample

A random sample of 2,000 households within the Oswegoland Park District service area was provided by the Marketing Systems Group, a survey sampling firm. The sample included names, email addresses, mailing addresses, and telephone numbers.

#### **Pretest**

CGS pretested the questionnaire with approximately 20 households. The pretest was designed to gauge whether the respondents understood the questions being asked and could provide the necessary information.

#### **Data Collection**

Each household in the random sample was sent an invitation email with a unique ID code and a link to the survey. This email may be found in Appendix B.

Follow-up communications are important to get responses from as high a proportion of the sample as possible, as harder to reach respondents often have different experiences and responses than easier to reach respondents. Therefore, CGS sent up to six reminder emails to those who did not respond after the initial email. The questionnaire and a cover letter were mailed to those who did not complete the survey online (See Appendix B for cover letter). Reminder calls were made to those who did not complete either the survey online or through the mail (See Appendix B for reminder call script).

The survey was open from April 5, 2023 to June 15, 2023.

A total of 528 completed surveys were received. The margin of error for the survey is +/- 4.2 percentage points at the 95 percent level of confidence.

#### **Data Analysis**

The data was weighted on age, gender, and race/ethnicity using information from the 2017-2021 American Community Survey. Data weighting on key demographic variables ensures that respondents to the survey are representative of the population of all adults in the Oswegoland Park District service area and that the findings can be generalized to the total adult population.

Chi-square tests were used to test significance between demographic groups. All demographic differences reported are statistically significant at the  $p \le 0.05$  level.

# **Findings**


# **Overall Opinion of the Park District**

The respondents were first asked a set of questions regarding their overall opinion of the Oswegoland Park District. The respondents were asked to rate their overall opinion of the Park District, to provide their favorite and least favorite thing about the Park District, and to indicate the likelihood of their household using the Park District in the next 12 months.

The respondents were asked to rate their overall opinion of the Park District on a scale from "0" to "10, where "0" was completely dislike and "10" was highest regard. 79.4% of the respondents have a positive impression of the Park District (rating of "6" or higher). The mean rating given was 7.53 (Figure 1).

# **Demographic Differences**

• Respondents with children in their household under the age of 18 (83.9%) were more likely than respondents with no children in their household under the age of 18 (70.3%) to rate the Park District "7" or higher.

When asked their *favorite* thing about the Park District the most common responses were the parks (16.5%), the variety/number/type of programs and events (16.5%), the walking and bike trails/paths (11.0%), and the programs/activities for children (10.2%) (Table 1) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

When asked their *least favorite* thing about the Park District a wide variety of responses were given. The top responses were cost (9.0%) and upkeep/maintenance of parks/facilities (7.7%). (Table 2) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).



Four-fifths (80.0%) of respondents indicated that their household is likely to use the Park District during the next 12 months, with 63.2% indicating their household is very likely (Figure 2).

# **Demographic Differences**

- The percentage who indicated that their household is likely to use the Park District facilities, programs or services during the next 12 months is highest among respondents 35-44 years of age (92.3%) and respondents 18-34 years of age (88.6%) and lowest among respondents 65 years of age or greater (63.7%). 78.4% of respondents 45-54 years of age and 75.0% of respondents 55-64 years of age reported that their household is likely to use the Park District.
- 94.8% of respondents with children in their household under the age of 18 compared with 74.8% of respondents with no children in their household under the age of 18 stated they are likely to use the Park District facilities, programs or services during the next 12 months.

#### **Awareness and Use of the Park District**

Next, the respondents were asked about their awareness and current use of 12 Oswegoland Park District parks, facilities, and community festivals.

First respondents were asked if they are aware of the 12 Oswegoland Park District parks, facilities, and community festivals. Seven out of ten or more respondents were aware of the PrairieFest (83.2%), Civic Center Aquatic Park (79.2%), Civic Center (77.3%), and Fox Bend Golf Course (73.3%). Awareness was lowest for Community Park at Grande Park (27.6%) and South Point Center (43.3%).

Those respondents who were aware of a park, facility, or community festival were then asked whether their household had visited or attended the park, facility, or community festival during the past 12 months. Seven out of ten respondents stated they visited Hudson Crossing Park (72.9%) and Prairie Point Community Park (72.5%). About one-half or less of respondents reported that their household had visited or attended the other parks, facilities, and community festivals asked about in the survey during the past 12 months (Table 3).

#### **Demographic Differences**

#### **Awareness**

- The percentage of respondents who were aware of PrairieFest increases as years living in the Park District service area increases (66.7%, less than 5 years; 82.4%, 5-9 years; 92.3%, 10-19 years; 92.5%, 20-29 years; 94.9%, 30 or more years).
- Respondents who have lived in the Park District service area 5 years or more (84.0%) were more likely than respondents who have lived in the Park District service area less than five years (61.5%) to be aware of the **Civic Center**.
- The percentage of respondents who were aware of the **Civic Center** decreases as age increases (91.1%, 18-34 years of age; 81.3%, 35-44 years of age; 81.1%, 45-54 years of age; 70.7%, 55-64 years of age; 55.6%, 65 years of age or greater).
- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (91.4%) were more likely than respondents who do not have children in their household under the age of 18 (73.5%) to be aware of the **Civic Center**.
- Respondents who have lived in the Park District service area 10 years or more (87.7%) were more likely than respondents who have lived in the Park District service area less than 10 years (60.5%) to be aware of the **Fox Bend Golf Course**.
- Respondents who have lived in the Park District service area 5 years or more (78.4%) were more likely than respondents who have lived in the Park District service area less than five years (46.2%) to be aware of **Boulder Point**.
- Respondents less than 55 years of age (76.7%) were more likely than respondents 55 years of age or greater (55.8%) to be aware of **Boulder Point**.
- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (87.1%) were more likely than respondents who do not have children in their household under the age of 18 (60.6%) to be aware of **Boulder Point**.
- Respondents less than 55 years of age (73.9%) were more likely than respondents 55 years of age or greater (55.8%) to be aware of **Prairie Point Community Park**.
- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (81.9%) were more likely than respondents who do not have children in their household under the age of 18 (60.6%) to be aware of **Prairie Point Community Park**.
- Respondents who have lived in the Park District service area 5 years or more (74.2%) were more likely than respondents who have lived in the Park District service area less than five years (43.6%) to be aware of the **Little White School Museum**.
- Respondents who have lived in the Park District service area 30 years or more were most likely to be aware of **Winrock Pool** (82.1%), followed by respondents who have lived in the Park District service area 5-29 years (65.8%). Respondents who have lived in the Park District service area less than 5 years are least likely to be aware of **Winrock Pool** (35.9%).

- Respondents less than 55 years of age (66.1%) were more likely than respondents 55 years of age or greater (46.5%) to be aware of **Winrock Pool**.
- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (80.2%) were more likely than respondents who do not have children in their household under the age of 18 (47.0%) to be aware of **Winrock Pool**.
- Respondents who have lived in the Park District service area 5 years or more (67.0%) were more likely than respondents who have lived in the Park District service area less than five years (35.9%) to be aware of **Hudson Crossing Park**.
- Respondents who have lived in the Park District service area 5 years or more (56.7%) were more likely than respondents who have lived in the Park District service area less than five years (17.9%) to be aware of **South Point Center**.
- Respondents less than 55 years of age (53.3%) were more likely than respondents 55 years of age or greater (29.1%) to be aware of **South Point Center**.
- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (70.7%) were more likely than respondents who do not have children in their household under the age of 18 (28.0%) to be aware of **South Point Center**.

#### Visited/Attended in Past !2 Months

- Respondents who have lived in the Park District service area 5 years or more (58.9%) were more likely than respondents who have lived in the Park District service area less than 5 years (32.7%) to have attended **PrairieFest** in the past 12 months.
- Respondents 45-54 years of age (84.9%) were most likely to have attended **PrairieFest** in the past 12 months, followed by respondents 35-44 years of age (67.3%). Respondents 55 years of age or greater (42.9%) and respondents 18-34 years of age (35.5%) were least likely to have attended PairieFest in the past 12 months.
- Respondents who are 35-44 years of age (56.6%) and respondents who are 45-54 years of age (50.0%) were most likely to have visited the Civic Center Aquatic Park during the past 12 months. 28.6% of respondents 18-34 years of age visited the Civic Center Aquatic Park during the past 12 months. Respondents who are 55-64 years of age (16.7%) and respondents 65 years of age or greater (15.6%) were least likely to have visited the Civic Center Aquatic Park during the past 12 months.
- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (56.3%) were more likely than respondents who do not have children in their household under the age of 18 (14.9%) to have visited the **Civic Center Aquatic Park** during the past 12 months.
- Respondents who are less than 45 years of age (56.5%) were more likely than respondents who are 45 years of age or greater (31.0%) to have visited the **Civic Center** during the past 12 months.

- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (59.4%) were more likely than respondents who do not have children in their household under the age of 18 (30.9%) to have visited the **Civic Center** during the past 12 months.
- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (59.4%) were more likely than respondents who do not have children in their household under the age of 18 (26.3%) to have visited **Boulder Point** during the past 12 months.
- The percentage of respondents who have visited **Prairie Point Community Park** decreases as years living in the Park District service area increases (89.8%, less than 5 years; 54.9%, 5-9 years; 49.2%, 10-19 years; 48.7%, 20-29 years; 33.3%, 30 years or more).
- Respondents less than 55 years of age (84.2%) were more likely than respondents 55 years of age or greater (45.8%) to have visited **Prairie Point Community Park** in the past 12 months.
- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (88.4%) were more likely than respondents who do not have children in their household under the age of 18 (60.0%) to have visited **Prairie Point Community Park** during the past 12 months.
- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (40.9%) were more likely than respondents who do not have children in their household under the age of 18 (16.1%) to have visited **Winrock Pool** during the past 12 months.
- Respondents who are 35-44 years of age (60.0%) were most likely to have visited **South Point Center** during the past 12 months, followed by respondents who are 18-34 years of age (48.7%) and respondents who are 45-54 years of age (31.8%). Respondents 55-64 years of age (8.3%) and respondents who are 65 years of age or greater (7.7%) were least likely to have visited South Point Center during the past 12 months.
- The percentage of respondents who indicated they have visited **Hudson Crossing Park** during the past 12 months decreases as age increases (93.6%, 18-34 years of age; 78.9%, 35-44 years of age; 66.6%, 45-54 years of age; 63.6%, 55-64 years of age; 52.2%, 65 years of age or greater).
- Respondents who have lived in the Park District service area less than 10 years (85.2%) were more likely than respondents who have lived in the Park District service area 10 or more years (68.4%) to have visited **Hudson Crossing Park** during the past 12 months.
- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (52.4%) were more likely than respondents who do not have children in their household under the age of 18 (21.6%) to have visited South Point Center during the past 12 months.

Those respondents who have participated in a recreational activity during the past 12 months were asked which organizations they used for the activity. The majority of respondents used the Oswegoland Park District for all of the recreational activities asked about in the survey except for theatre (47.7%), adult sports leagues (42.2%), adult classes (37.4%), and fitness (33.9%).

Almost one-third (31.3%) of respondents indicated their needs are not being met by any organization for adult sports leagues, one fourth (25.3%) of respondents stated their needs are not being met by any organization for adult classes, and 10.4% of respondents reported their needs are not being met by any organization for fitness. The respondents were asked to share reasons that deter them or their household from using the Oswegoland Park District parks, facilities, or programs. The most frequent responses were cost (11.0%) and they have no children, they have no young children, or their children are grown (10.4%). 12.7% of respondents commented there are no reasons that deter them or their household from using the Park District parks, facilities, or programs (Table 5) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

The respondents were asked where they participate in their summer water activities. The respondents indicated a variety of locations, with 29.8% stating the Oswegoland Park District (Figure 3).

# **Demographic Differences**

- Respondents who rent their home (49.0%) were more likely than respondents who own their home (27.3%) to participate in their summer water activities at the Oswegoland Park District.
- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (42.9%) were more likely respondents who have no children in their household under the age of 18 (15.9%) to participate in their summer water activities at the Oswegoland Park District.

Those respondents who do not use the Oswegoland Park District for their summer water activities were asked why not.

The most frequent responses for why they don't use the Oswegoland Park District for summer water activities are they use their neighborhood/homeowner association/apartment pool (16.8%) and they have their own pool (13.1%). 8.4% of respondents indicated the Oswegoland Park District's water amenities are too crowded (Table 6) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

The respondents were asked to indicate what would increase their household's use of the parks, facilities, or programs in the future. A wide variety of responses were given. The most frequent responses were lower prices (7.8%), add aquatic facility (7.8%), more adult/older adult programs (7.7%), more class options offered (7.7%), and improved aquatic facilities/improved aquatic facilities' hours/add adult swim/other improvements to aquatic facilities (7.2%). 12.2% of the respondents commented that nothing would increase their household's use of the parks, facilities, or programs. (Table 7) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

# **Satisfaction With the Park District**


A set of questions was asked about satisfaction with various aspects of the Park District, including the parks, facilities, and community festivals, programs, customer service, ease of registering for programs, and communication.

Respondents who were aware of a park, facility, or community festival were asked to rate their satisfaction with the park, facility, or community festival. The majority of respondents were satisfied with each of the parks, facilities, and community festivals asked about in the survey. The highest percentage of respondents indicated they were satisfied with Prairie Point

Community Park (95.6%) and the lowest percentages of respondents indicated that they were satisfied with Boulder Point (80.4%) and the Civic Center (80.5%) (Figure 4).

#### **Demographic Differences**

Respondents who have no children in their household under the age of 18 (96.3%) were
more likely than respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18
(72.7%) to be satisfied with Saw Wee Kee Park.

Those respondents who rated a park, facility, or community festival fair or poor were asked why they gave that rating.

#### **Hudson Crossing Park**

The respondents would like more access to the river and more water-based sports at Hudson Crossing Park. Also, they would like the Park District to purchase land along the river and extend Hudson Crossing Park.

"Would love to see Hudson Crossing somehow take more advantage of the location on the river. Could there be more water-based activities, docks, etc.?"

"More access to the river at Hudson Crossing Park."

"The park district should continue to purchase property along the river and extend Hudson Crossing as far north and south as possible. This should be a public gem of Oswego."

#### South Point Center

According to the respondents, the room for exercise at South Point Center "is not large enough" and "the temperature control is not sufficient."

# **Prairie Point Community Park**

The main comments about Prairie Point Community Park regarded the restrooms being "disgusting" and "smelly."

#### Community Park at Grande Park

There were no comments specific to this park.

#### **Boulder Point**

A couple of respondents commented there is "a lot of crime in the area where Boulder Point is located."

#### Winrock Pool

Respondents mentioned that Winrock Pool is not open to the public, there is not enough parking, is old, and there are not enough shady areas.

"Furious that second pool (Winrock) is used mainly for swim team! Taxpayers paid for that pool, and it should be open to taxpayers every day!! Let the swim team use it in the early morning!"

"Insufficient parking at Winrock during swim meets."

"Winrock Pool is old."

"Winrock Pool doesn't have enough shady areas."

## Little White School Museum

Respondents commented that "exhibits are stale" and they are not sure what the building is used for "except perhaps walk throughs by grade school students."

#### <u>Civic Center Aquatic Park</u>

Respondents mentioned that the Civic Center Aquatic Park is too crowded, run down, the locker rooms are outdated and dirty, there is not enough shaded seating, and the kids/teens are disruptive.

"Locker rooms are outdated, and some are smelly; not enough shaded seating."

"The kids/teens are allowed to get disruptive to other guests. The locker rooms are often dirty."

"The pool is out of date. The pool is now overrun by pre-teens without parents. They are ruining the experience for everyone."

"Our Civic Center Aquatic Center is too small and run down for a town that has 35,000 people in it. People are shoulder to shoulder on hot days. We stopped going and got pass to Raging Waves instead."

"Pools are way too crowded to be worth going or getting a season pass. Civic Center pool is so crowded it's often not able to be kept clean."

#### See Wee Kee Park

Respondents said that See Wee Kee Park "seems a little run down and could use some updating" and it "could use more signage."

## **PrairieFest**

Respondents commented that PrairieFest needs better entertainment, more rides, more vendors, especially local vendors and food vendors, and is too spread out.

"PrairieFest has been way too spread out the last couple times I've visited. Really far walk between the crafters to food to carnival or car show."

"Need better entertainment at PrairieFest. Most of the bands we have never heard of."

"PrairieFest has really gone downhill. It is not the same festival it was years ago. Used to have way more vendors that we could shop at and the food vendors choices stink. Bring back the fun."

"PrairieFest not local enough too many outside vendors."

## Fox Bend Golf Course

The main comments about the Fox Bend Golf Course regarded the new greens being constructed.

"The new greens at Fox Bend never seemed necessary to me in the first place and but they are taking too long."

"I felt Fox Bend should have provided some fee reduction when we were playing on a course under construction and not a complete 18 holes."

#### **Civic Center**

Respondents stated the Civic Center is outdated and small.

"Civic Center needs updating, feels like its stuck 20+ years in the past."

"It needs remodeling. It's small and outdated."


"The outside of the Civic Center needs some TLC. We visit for classes frequently. There are roof shingles on the side facing the small wood garden where the shingles are falling off."

#### **General Comments**

Several respondents provided general comments about the facilities. They mentioned that "many of the facilities are showing their age" and need to be updated.

Most respondents are satisfied with the appearance (93.7%), cleanliness (93.6%), and maintenance of parks and facilities (88.9%) (Figure 5).

Those respondents who rated the appearance of the parks and facilities, the cleanliness of the parks and facilities, or the maintenance of the parks and facilities fair or poor rating were asked why they gave that rating.

## Appearance of Parks and Facilities

Respondents stated some "older parks and buildings could use an update," "remove weeds from parks," and "add more flowers and welcoming amenities to the parks."

#### Cleanliness of Parks and Facilities

Respondents mentioned there is garbage on the grounds, garbage cans are not emptied, equipment is not clean, and restrooms are dirty.

"Garbage, equipment not always clean, ... graffiti, ..."

"Over the past year or so, cleanup efforts have been minimal. Hire someone to pick up the trash that is left by people (unfortunate to have to do that) but it makes our parks look bad."

"Restrooms are usually filthy."

# Maintenance of Parks and Facilities

The respondents commented that the equipment at some of the parks is broken, and the bike trails need better maintenance.

"The spinner thing at Hudson Crossing has been broken for literally 5+ years."

"At some of the parks the stuff for the kids don't work."

"Bike trails need constant maintenance, so they are not like a washboard."

The three top improvements respondents would like the Park District to make to the parks and facilities are add or expand the parks, facilities, or equipment (17.6%), update or upgrade the parks, facilities, or equipment (16.9%), and provide better upkeep or maintenance (10.8%). 17.8% of respondents reported there are no improvements they would like the Park District to make to the parks and facilities (Table 8) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).



The majority of respondents were satisfied with the Park District programs asked about in the survey. Satisfaction was highest for the As We Grow Preschool (98.6%) and dance (97.3%). Satisfaction was lowest for fitness (79.0%), adult classes (81.8%) and the adult sport leagues (83.3%) (Figure 6).

# **Demographic Differences**

- 90.7% of female respondents compared with 72.0% of male respondents were satisfied with the adult sports leagues.
- 85.7% of female respondents compared with 67.5% of male respondents. were satisfied with fitness.

Those respondents who rated a program fair or poor were asked why they gave that rating.

#### As We Grow Preschool

A couple of respondents said it is "more like daycare" than preschool. One respondent stated that the staff was "inattentive to child."

#### <u>Dance</u>

Respondents indicated that "dance program is good for kids but would like various dance classes for adults."

# **Youth Classes**

Respondents would like "more variety." They suggested adding computer and drawing classes. They also suggested adding more classes for children 13 or older. A few respondents mentioned "the classes are expensive."

# **Special Events**

Respondents gave a variety of reasons for rating special events fair or poor including but not limited to being too expensive, too crowded, and not having small town feel/charm.

"Too expensive, too crowded, no local flair."

"They have gone downhill and no longer are appealing. Downtown Oswego has lost its country charm and so have the events. Need more small-town country charm events and less booshie type. Even the Christmas program has lost its charm."

"Lost small town feel."

"Not enough for young adults."

"We don't have to keep same events every single year. Mix it up!!!"

"Would like to see Country Market expanded with more vendors and more frequent live music."

#### <u>Limelight Theatre Company</u>

Respondent commented "the kids and director are great and enthusiastic," but the shows are "consistently hard to hear and understand."

#### Early Childhood Classes

The respondents stated that their "child did not enjoy the classes," "it was a fair experience," and the "level of instruction was not appropriate."

## **Youth Athletics**

The comments about youth athletics regarded the variety of options offered, the cost, the amount of practice time, and the coaches.

"Don't keep score, not a lot of options, expensive."

"Not a lot of guidance. Not enough practice time before first baseball game (2 weeks)."

"Not enough variety."

"Poor experience with coaching in the past."

#### **Gymnastics**

The main comments respondents had about gymnastics was that their child did not improve or was limited in how far they could progress while in the Park District program.

"My daughter did not improve with 3+ years of training but improved immensely once we left and joined a private facility."

"When my child was in the program, she didn't grow in the program like friends who were doing private studios. My child was in the program for a few years."

"My daughter used to do the gymnastic program, but we felt she was limited in how far she could progress with the park district classes. there were not enough assessments and she ended up taking the same class level repeatedly and lost interest."

# **Kid's Connection**

Respondents mentioned there was a lack of activities, large class sizes, not enough discipline, and it was expensive.

"I had a child in the program at one time and was not impressed with the teachers. I did not find that they gave them activities to challenge them."

"Very expensive"

"The quality of programs could be better. Better management of kids and more discipline."

"When my kids attended, they were not engaged. When I would pick them up, they were playing the same one game or laying around on mats. The supervisors were not organizing anything."

"When we used it there was a lack of activities and large class sizes."

#### Adult Sports Leagues

Respondents commented "there is not many options/variety of sports" and "there are no leagues during the winter."

#### **Adult Classes**

Respondents stated that there are "not many options for adult classes," "nothing of interest," and "times classes are offered are limited."

# <u>Fitness</u>

Respondents would like "more variety of classes and times offered" and a "good indoor facility with a gymnasium."

Respondents would like the Oswegoland Park District to add a variety of programs in the future including adult/senior programs (16.5%) and festivals or events (11.2%). 7.9% of respondents indicated there are no programs they would like the Park District to add in the future (Table 9) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).



More than four-fifths of respondents were satisfied with the customer service provided byPark District staff (90.9%), the Park District social media (82.8%), the ease of registering for programs (82.1%), the Park District website (81.7%), the availability of information about parks/facilities (81.3%), and the availability of information about programs (81.2%) (Figure 7).

#### **Demographic Differences**

Respondents who have no children in their household under the age of 18 (96.6%) were
more likely than respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18
(79.6%) to be satisfied with the ease of registering for programs.

Respondents less than 45 years of age (88.0%) were more likely than respondents 45 years
of age or greater (69.9%) to be satisfied with the availability of information about parks and
facilities.

Those respondents who rated an aspect of the Park District fair or poor were asked why they gave that rating.

## <u>Customer Service from Park District Staff</u>

Respondents mentioned that Park District staff are not knowledgeable, not responsive, not courteous, and do not respond in a timely manner.

"Staff isn't always able to answer questions."

"Sometimes no response, long wait time on response."

"It would be nice is staff were more informed about details of programs. For example-giving more guidance to parents about karate level placement during registration. Also, details on Otters (time of swim meets)."

"When I expressed my frustration with Winrock being closed for open swim and the Civic Center not being open on Monday, the manager just gave me a bunch of excuses. He wasn't empathetic or apologetic."

"They seem bothered when you ask a question. Short abrupt answers."

"When I called to ask a question about the swim team and swim passes I left a message with someone and didn't get a call back for a month (I'd already called again by then and was finally able to get an answer)."

# Park District Social Media

Respondents believe that the "Park District needs more of a presence on social media". They stated there are "not enough posts" and "not enough information."

# **Ease of Registering for Programs**

Respondents provided several reasons why they rated ease of registering for programs fair or poor, including creating an account took a bit of time, website is not mobile friendly, registration is confusing, it is difficult to find programs, and system is slow.

"Creating an account was a bit long."

"The website is not mobile friendly. An app that allows you to choose the class you want and pay with Apple Pay would be nice."

"It is not as intuitive as it should be. It's sometimes confusing."

"Sometimes your system is slow and locks up."

"When searching for a class or activity, you have to know the exact name, or it doesn't show up. You should have a filter that brings up classes similar to the one you're searching for."

#### Park District Website

Respondents commented the website is "hard to navigate," "it is difficult to find information, "needs better organization," and "it isn't very mobile friendly."

# Availability of Information About Parks and Facilities

Respondents mentioned that it is difficult to find information about the parks and facilities on the Park District website because "information is buried" and they would prefer to receive information in the mail or sent by email.


# **Availability of Information About Programs**

Most respondents who rated the availability of information about programs fair or poor stated "it is not easy to find out what is available and where." Several respondents said they would prefer to receive the brochure in the mail rather than search for programs online.

Most respondents (85.4%) agreed with the statement "Members of my household feel we belong at the Oswegoland Park District", with 55.9% strongly agreeing (Figure 8).

To what extent do you agree with the following statement? "Members of my household feel we belong at the Oswegoland Park District."




# **Demographic Differences**

• Asian respondents (95.0%) and White respondents (90.0%) were more likely than respondents of two or more races (80.0%), Hispanic respondents (76.0%), and Black respondents (71.4%) to agree with the statement.

Of those respondents who indicated there is a member of their household who identifies with a disability, most (85.0%) agreed with the statement "The Oswegoland Park District has effectively provided accommodations", with 62.6% strongly agreeing (Figure 9).

To what extent do you agree with the following statement? "The Oswegoland Park District has effectively provided accommodations"




# **Value of the Park District**

A set of questions about the value of the Oswegoland Park District was then asked. The respondents were asked about how valuable the Park District is and the benefits the Park District provides to their household and the community.

The majority (88.4%) of respondents believe the Park District is valuable to **their community**, with 73.0% indicating it is very valuable. Compared with 78.8% of respondents who think the Park District is valuable to **their household**, with 55.8% indicating it is very valuable (Figure 10).

No significant demographic differences were found.

#### Value of Park District to Household


- The percentage of respondents who believe the Park District is valuable to their household decreases as age increases (88.7%, 18-34 years of age; 83.1%, 35-44 years of age; 78.4%, 45-54 years of age; 73.2%, 55-64 years of age; 67.5%, 65 years of age or greater).
- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (91.4%) were more likely than respondents who do not have children in their household under the age of 18 (74.9%%) to believe the Park District is very valuable to their household.

Eleven benefits park district parks, trails, and nature areas may provide were listed and respondents were asked if they agree or disagree the Oswegoland Park District parks, trails, and nature areas provide each of the benefits.

More than nine out of ten respondents agreed that the Oswegoland Park District parks, trails, and nature area provide healthy recreational opportunities (91.6%) and preserve open space and the environment (90.8%) (Figure 11).

Do you agree or disagree the Oswegoland Park District parks, trails, and nature areas provide each of the following benefits?




#### **Demographic Differences**

- Male respondents (90.5%) were more likely than female respondents to agree that the Oswegoland Park District parks, trails, and nature areas improve physical health and wellbeing.
- The percentage of respondents who agreed that the Oswegoland Park District parks, trails, and nature areas **increase property values in the surrounding area** decreases as age increases (96.2%, 18-34 years of age; 87.7%, 35-44 years of age; 81.1%, 45-54 years of age; 75.0%, 55-64 years of age; 68.3%, 65 years of age or greater).

Three-fourths (75.0%) of respondents believe the overall value the Park District represents, given its share of the property taxes is excellent (36.6%) or good (38.4%) (Figure 12).

How would you rate the overall value that the Park District represents, given its share of the property taxes?




#### **Demographic Differences**

• The percentage of respondents who believe the overall value the Park District represents, given its share of the property taxes decreases as age increases (96.2%, 18-34 years of age; 81.0%, 35-44 years of age; 65.9%, 45-54 years of age; 62.1%, 55-64 years of age; 57.0%, 65 years of age or greater).

Only 18.9% of respondents were aware that the Park District offers financial assistance to eligible households (Figure 13).

Figure 13: Awareness of Financial Assistance for Eligible Households


Are you aware that the Oswegoland Park District offers financial assistance to eligible households?



#### **Future Direction of the Park District**

Next the respondents were asked about how supportive they are of the Oswegoland Park District budgeting funds for seven initiatives.

Almost all (92.2%) of respondents state they are very or somewhat supportive of the Park District budgeting funds for maintaining and improving the current aquatic facilities. Most (87.8%) respondents said they are very or somewhat supportive of the Park District budgeting funds for acquiring land for parks (Figure 14).

#### **Demographic Differences**

- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (87.7%) were more likely than respondents who have no children in their household under the age of 18 (62.7%) to be supportive of the Park District budgeting funds for building a splash pad/spray park.
- Respondents who have children in their household under the age of 18 (70.3%) were more likely than respondents who have no children in their household under the age of 18 (52.4%) to be supportive of the Park District budgeting funds for building a skate park.

Those respondents who indicated they were not very supportive or not at all supportive of the Park District budgeting funds for an initiative were asked why they gave that rating.

#### Maintain and Improve the Current Aquatic Facilities

The majority of respondents who indicated they would not be supportive of the Park District budgeting funds to maintain and improve the current aquatic facilities commented they do not use the aquatic facilities.

#### **Acquire Land for Parks**

Respondents believe there are enough parks and would prefer that funds be used to maintain the existing parks and facilities. Respondents are also concerned about increases in their taxes.

"Do we really need more parks? How about funds for better maintenance of the ones already in existence?"

"I'd rather see money spent on things we have that are not maintained."

"I think there are enough parks."

"I am concerned about the increased cost to the taxpayer of additional parks and facilities, particularly in light of the increased cost being charged for park district activities."

"More land = more taxes."

#### Build a Splash Pad/Spray Park

Respondents questioned whether another splash pad/spray park is necessary. Respondents also commented that a splash pad/spray park is used by a very limited proportion of residents and is used only during a short period of time during the year.

#### **Build Outdoor Tennis Courts**

Respondents questioned whether more tennis courts are necessary and stated they would not use the courts. A few respondents mentioned that the existing tennis courts are hardly used.

#### **Build Outdoor Full Court Basketball Courts**

Most respondents said their household would not use the basketball courts. Several respondents were concerned that the basketball courts may attract "a bad crowd of teens" and cause increased crime.

#### **Build Outdoor Pickeball Courts**

Respondents commented that "pickleball is just a fad." Additionally, respondents were concerned about the noise, the increase in their taxes, and whether there was a need for more pickleball courts.

#### **Build a Skate Park**

Respondents mentioned that there is already a skate park, it may "draw a bad crowd," and it is dangerous and cause injuries.

#### **Information Sources About the Park District**

The next section of the survey was about how the respondents learn about the Oswegoland Park District, their most preferred method of learning about the Park District, and their preferred language for receiving information about the Park District.


Respondents learn about the Oswegoland Park District from a variety of information sources. More than two-fifths (43.7%) of respondents reported they learn about the Park District from the community banners/signs, with 23.2% indicating it is their preferred source. 43.3% of respondents said they learn about the Park District from the Park District website, with 23.4% indicating it is their preferred source. 38.9% of respondents state they learn about the Park District from Park District emails, with 35.6% saying it is their preferred source. 37.5% of respondents indicated they learn about the Park District from the digital seasonal brochure, with 27.5% reporting it is their preferred source. More than one-fourth (28.7%) of respondents reported they learn about the Park District social media, with 21.5% stating it is their preferred source (Figure 15).

#### **Demographic Differences**

Source of Information About the Park District

- 56.3% of respondents aged 35-44 and 45.6% of respondents 18-34 years of age indicated they learn about the Park District from the **Park District website**. The percentage of respondents who reported they learn about the Park District from the Park District website then decreases as age increases (37.8%, 45-54 years of age; 26.8%, 55-64 years of age; 17.8%, 65 years of age or greater).
- Hispanic respondents (55.4%) were more likely than White respondents (36.6%) and respondents of other races/ethnicities (23.3%) to learn about the Park District from the **Park District website**.
- Respondents with children in their household under the age of 18 (54.3%) were more likely than respondents with no children in their household under the age of 18 (29.5%) to learn about the Park District from **Park District website**.
- Respondents with children in their household under the age of 18 (56.0%) were more likely than respondents with no children in their household under the age of 18 (36.4%) to learn about the Park District from **Park District emails**.
- The percentage of respondents who learn about the Park District from the **Park District digital seasonal brochure** increases as years living in the Park District service area increases up to 29 years when the percentage of respondents decreases (21.8%, less than 5 years; 35.3%, 5-9 years; 52.3%, 10-19 years; 64.1%, 20-29 years; 46.2%, 30 years or more).
- White respondents (49.4%) were most likely than Hispanic respondents (28.6%) and respondents of other races/ethnicities (23.3%) to learn about the Park District from the **Park District digital seasonal brochure**.
- Respondents with children in their household under the age of 18 (55.2%) were more likely than respondents with no children in their household under the age of 18 (28.0%) to learn about the Park District from the **Park District digital seasonal brochure**.
- Respondents who have lived in the Park District service area 5-29 years (43.9%) were most likely to learn about the Park District from the Park District social media. 25.6% of respondents who have lived in the Park District service area 30 years or more learn about the Park District from the Park District social media. Respondents who have lived in the Park District service area less than 5 years (11.5%) are least likely to learn about the Park District from the Park District social media.
- Respondents less than 55 years of age (37.8%) were more likely than respondents 55 years of age or greater (17.4%) to learn about the Park District from the **Park District social media**.
- Hispanic respondents (53.6%) were more likely than respondents of other races/ethnicities (33.3%) and White respondents (26.2%) to learn about the Park District from the **Park District social media**.


• Respondents with children in their household under the age of 18 (38.8%) were more likely than respondents with no children in their household under the age of 18 (26.0%) to learn about the Park District from **friends and neighbors**.

Most Preferred Source of Information About the Park District

- Respondents with children in their household under the age of 18 (37.9%) were more likely
  than respondents with no children in their household under the age of 18 (27.3%) to indicate
  their most preferred source of information about the Park District is Park District emails.
- The percentage of respondents who indicated their most preferred source of information about the Park District is **Park District emails** decreases as age increases (48.1%, 18-34 years of age; 31.3%, 35-44 years of age; 29.7%, 45-54 years of age, 17.8%, 55-64 years of age, 7.3%, 65 years of age or greater).

Almost all (96.7%) respondents would prefer to receive information about the Park District in English and 3.3% would prefer to receive information about the Park District in Spanish. No other languages were specified (See Figure 16).

#### **Conclusions and Recommendations**

The Oswegoland Park District is doing a good job of serving residents. The respondents perceive the Park District to be valuable to their community and household. Satisfaction is high for the Park District parks, facilities, community festivals, and programs. Satisfaction with customer service provided by Park District staff is very high. The majority of respondents indicate that their household is likely to use the Park District in the next 12 months.

Awareness is high for most of the Park District parks, facilities, and community festivals especially for the PrairieFest, Civic Center Aquatic Park, Civic Center, and Fox Bend Golf Course.

The majority of respondents use the Oswegoland Park District for the recreational activities asked about in the survey with the exception of adult sports leagues, adult classes, and fitness. Additionally, for those three recreational activities a large proportion of respondents indicated their needs are not being met by any organization. The Park District should consider adding more adult sport leagues and adult classes. Additionally, the Park District should consider studying the feasibility of building a fitness center/gym.

There is less of a feeling of belonging at the Park District among Hispanic respondents, Black respondents, and respondents of 2 or more races. The Park District should explore ways of increasing the feeling of belonging among these groups.

The cost of programs and pool passes is mentioned as a factor that deters use of the Park District. Only a small proportion of respondents are aware that financial assistance is available to eligible households. The Park District should consider ways of reducing the cost of programs and pool passes and better publicizing the available financial assistance.

The Park District should continue using a variety of methods to communicate with residents. New residents to the Oswegoland area are less likely to be aware of the parks, facilities, and community festivals. The Park District should develop methods to communicate with new residents about what the Park District offers.

The respondents comment they would like the Park District to better maintain and update the current parks and facilities. The respondents think the Park District should budget funds to maintain and improve the current aquatic facilities and acquire land for parks. The Park District should consider budgeting funds to maintain and update the current parks and facilities especially the aquatic facilities and to acquire land for parks.



As an example, T-ball: I couldn't sign up my son when he was 2yrs old (late winter/early spring, or whenever registration opens...May?), for the T-ball event (minimum age of 3), when it started in June, when he would've hit the age requirement.
